ADDRESS.

To the FREE and INDEPENDENT People of MASSACHUSETTS.

Fellow-Citizens,

A LARGE and respectable Convention of Citizens, from all parts of the Commonwealth, after ascertaining that our late worthy Governor CHRISTOPHER GORE declined being considered a Candidate for the Chair; UNANIMOUSLY resolved to recommend to your suffrages the ensuing year,

CALEB STRONG, for Governor, WILLIAM PHILLIPS, for Lieut. Governor,

Upon the characters of these candidates, and their claims for office, it would be superfluous to enlarge. Governor STRONG for several years sustained the office of Chief Magistrate with dignity, ability, moderation, and firmness. The office of the characters of these candidates, and their claims for office, it would be superfluous to enlarge. fice was respected, and the State was prosperous under his administration. Mr. PHILLIPS is a gentleman extensively known and respected in the Commonwealth, for his exemplary moral character, his deportment in public and private life; -for the steadiness of his principles, and the munificence of his charity.

During the current political year, the people of this Commonwealth have wit. nessed a state of affairs, entirely new in their annals, and equally alarming and unexpected.

The Governor, forgetful of the claim of the whole people to Executive Patron. age, has condescended to devote himself not merely to gratify, but inflame the passions of the Party which supported his election, comprising a small and perhaps a doubtful majority of legal voters.

He began his administration the past year by denouncing, in effect, our ancient and faithful Metropolis, as an Assemblage of Malcontents prepared to resist by open violence the Laws of their Country. He has also given currency to a reproach upon the whole State, by asserting the existence of a combination within its bosom, hostile to its Liberties, and sufficiently formidable to require public animadversion, which, under the dominion of " foreign influence," is engaged in plots of a treasonable complexion. By the sanction of such high authority, at an alarming juncture, when united talents and mutual confidence have become necessary to provide for the common defence, against impending WAR; jealousies are sown between Town and Country-The Commonwealth is degraded in the estimation of our Sister States, and encouragement is afforded to a foreign nation, in the event of WAR, of finding numerous adherents among our own Citizens.

For this grievous accusation, unsupported .by documents or evidence of any kind, the citizens implicated have afforded no pretence to his Excellency, except by their protestations against the ruinous tendency of the Non-Importation System, which is now declared by many of its former advocates, and by the most respecta-ble members of the majority in Congress, to be utterly ineffectual, except for the purposes of fraud and perjury, and the consummation of our national ruin.

To confirm the power of this party, the Governor has co-operated with the Legislature in a plan of pretended reformation, which threatens the freedom of speech and even of opinion, and is at variance with the first elements of a free constitution.

It is the professed basis of this plan, that a difference in political opinion from the present administration disqualifies a man for the service of the state in any depart. ment, civil or military, elevated or humble.

Shoriffs, Clerks of Judicial Courts and other subordinate officers, merel room by their removal for successors of different political principles.

In pursuance of this system, the new offices, with a very few exceptions, have been engrossed by individuals of one political party, generally nominated by secret assemblies of men without responsibility. Old and approved servants of the Public, whose locks have whitened in the duties of the cabinet and the field; Officers in the revolutionary army, aged members of Congress, and other faithful and able men, have been driven from their places, without any imputation but the crime of opinion, and doomed to wear out the remnant of their days in unmerited poverty

But this projected reformation will not be limited merely to the removal of officers, and to the increase of executive patronage—It is destined by its authors to pervade every department, civil, judicial and military—Already it has sapped the foundation of our most venerable institutions. The Supreme Judicial Court is threatened in terms of open menace. The jurisdiction of that Court in constitutional questions is denied, and its decisions in many instances are doubted and censured. It is proposed to divide the Commonwealth into Districts, so as to secure Off Folkstone, Dec. 11-Ar. Martha, Barrett, in the Senate, the permanent ascendancy of the party, without respect to any change which the will of the people may effect in the other departments of government, By this proposed division, a perfect contempt is manifested for immemorial usage, geographical boundaries, local convenience, and "the proportion of the public taxes paid by the respective Districts." Counties are divided into sections in the most irregular and inconvenient forms, so that further divisions may be facilitated in order to detach from each other old friends and associates, who have been in the habit of acting together for the common good—Towns have been carved into parts upon the application of minor portions of the inhabitants, by lines arbitrary and capricious, separating from each other families and intimate connections, calculated merely to break down the influence of the respectable and steady part of the population. The Treasury has been opened for the pay of the Representatives, so that the number, already too unwieldy for the dispatch of public business, may be increased to an enormous bulk, rendering impracticable all fair deliberation, and compelling the many to be led blindfold by the few. This measure will operate as a wanton dissipation of public money, to prevent the due execution of public husiness. In short, the maxim is established, "overturn and overturn," until every vestige of our ancient habits and institutions shall be effaced, and until the substantial and independent men of all parties shall be driven from a participation in the government, and those who, by talents, property, sound principles, or honest hearts, are best qualified to influence the course of affairs, shall be supplanted by the bold,

aspiring and unprincipled part of the community, in every parish, town and county. To justify these enormous strides towards the worst species of despotism, nothing can be alledged against the minority, but their opposition to the system of commercial restrictions imposed by our national rulers; and the fruits of which are already seen, in the ruin of Commerce, the approach of War, Standing Armies, the whole system of Internal Taxes, including a LAND TAX and a STAMP ACF, an empty Treasury and future prospects more dismal than present embarrassments, It would be tedious in an address of this description to attempt an elaborate review of the measures which have changed the joy of our nation into mourning; but it will not be impertinent to remind you of the principles avowed by the friends of Washington, in relation to the obnoxious Orders and Decress of the belligerent powers, that you may perceive distinctly wherein they are culpable :-

These principles are-

First-That in the present state of Europe and of America, neither the honer or interest of this nation required us to embark in the War, but that it was our policy to husband our resources, to glean whatever might be gathered from the remnant of our commerce, and to prepare for a more favorable occasion of vindicating our rights.

Then follows GenAuchmuty's detailed account of the operations of his forces, and of the desperate assault on his enemy's entrenched lines on the 26th Aug. which he completly carried. Of the French Duch loss, he says, "We have taken near 5000 prisoners." " Gen. Jansen escaped during the action, with a few cavalry, the sole remains of an army of 10,000 men." "About 1000 of the enemy's dead have been buried in the works; multitudes were cut down in the retreat, the rivers are chocked up with the dead, and the huts and woods are filled up with the wounded who have since expired." The British loss was hea-The total killed 15 European Officers, from a Lt. Colonel to Ensigns, 4 native officers, and 122 rank and file. Total wounded, 62 European officers, from Lt. Cols. to Ensigns, 15 native officers; and 756 non-commissioned and rank and file; with 13 rank and file missing. The principal officer killed was Lt. Col. Wm. M'Leod, of the 69th foot. Maj. Campbell of the 78th was wounded, and is since dead. Capts. Kennedy of the 14th; Olpherts of the 59th; and Ross of the 69th were killed. The following is a list of the French officers made prisoners, viz. 3 Generals of Brigade, 5 Colonels, 5 Majors, 21 Lt. The Bill for districting the Commonwealth, was again debated. A motion was made, that it be committed for the purpose of amendment. This motion was advocated by Messrs. Whitman, Mills, Bigelow, Savage, Bannister, of Newburyport, Adams, Fay, Bangs of Hawley, Lowe of Lyman, Davis and others; and opposed by Messrs. M. L. Hill, Foster, Smith of W. S. and Mitchell of Bridgwater, and negatived. The Mitchell of Bridgwater, and negatived. The previous question was then demanded by Mr. Coffin, and the question on the passage of the bill carried as follows: Ayes 278
Noes 231
Majority 47

So the bill has passed to be engrossed in concurrence with the Senate.

Ordered, That Messrs. Chamberlain, Hooper, Cutler, Dwight, and Austin, be a committee to consider the expediency of issuing precepts to the Selectmen of the several Towns and Assessors of Plantations, directing them to convene the qualified voters of their respective Towns Plantations, for the purpose of collecting their sentiments on the necessity or expediency of revising the 3d Section in the 1st Chapter of the Constitution of this Commonwealth, so far as it respects representation; and to report by resolve or otherwise.

A joint committee was appointed to consider the expediency of providing by law for a uniform mode of taking the number of rateable polls in the several Towns in this Commonwealth, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

A committee was also appointed to consider the expediency of amending the law establishing the Circuit Court of Common Pleas, so far as relates to appeals from judgment rendered by said Court, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

We consider the above proceedings as involving almost every principle of our elective franchise; and are probably intended, in co-operation with the new arrangement of Senatorial Districts, to destroy every vestige of the antient customs and usages of the Commonwealth.
